SCHOOLS AND THE COMMUNITY: A FOOTHILLS HISTORY

In February, the East Valley School District passed a maintenance and operation levy. Although the margin was narrow, its passage follows a long tradition of support for schools in the area. The Foothills area has been supporting local schools since the late 1800s.

The very first school in the Foothills area was formed around 1887 on the site of an old sawmill operation in the Foothills. There are few details about this first school but classes were most likely held in the living quarters of one of the sawmill workers.

The second school, Harris Hill School, was built in the early 1890s and was used until the spring of 1904. It was located near the intersection of Morrison and McMahan Roads and was a very simple building that was never even painted. At the time, residents were not particularly concerned about a division of church and state; they

needed to get the greatest use possible out of very limited local resources. Therefore, this second schoolhouse was only a school during the week—on Sunday, it was the local church.

The third school, officially the Pleasant Valley School, was commonly known as the Old Yellow Schoolhouse. It was located at Lincoln and Forker Roads, cost \$804, and opened on Oct. 16, 1899.

By the following year, both the teacher at the Harris Hill School and the teacher at the Old Yellow Schoolhouse were boarding with

the Johnson family, according to Violet Johnson Pipgrass' biography "My Memories of Growing Up and Pioneer Days in the Foothills." The Johnsons had recently completed an addition to their home and had room to house the two schoolteachers; early Foothills teachers either boarded with local families or lived in tents near their respective schools.

The fourth school was the Foothills School, although everyone called it the Frog Pond School. This school was located just east of Forker Road and approximately a half-mile south of Temple Road. It was completed on October 12, 1904 and cost \$898 to construct.

The fifth school was the Millville School, although today we generally think of it as Foothills School and our current Community Center. Completed August 24, 1905, it was another local effort, with the lumber used to build the school handpicked from the Kronquist sawmill. The new school was truly located at the hub of the growing community, as the Foothills Methodist Episcopal Church (now Foothills Community Church) was dedicated just a few months earlier on February 19, 1905.

Frog Pond School

An extension for primary grades was added to the Millville School in 1911. At that time, the Frog Pond School and the Old Yellow School House, along with the extension to the Millville School, served all Foothills students in the primary grades. The large room in the Millville School had a separate teacher for grades eight, nine, and ten.

This arrangement lasted until 1920. It was at that point that the Frog Pond School and the Old Yellow School House both closed and high school classes ceased. The Millville school retained two teachers and served the lower four grades in the west room, currently the kitchen area of the Community Center, and served grades five through eight in the east room. Foothills students who wished to continue past the eighth grade had to be transported to Pleasant Prairie School and later to West Valley High School.

Foothills residents continued to utilize the

buildings of the former Old Yellow School House and Frog Pond School following their closure. The community used the Old Yellow School House as a meeting site until it burned on December 15, 1939. In 1927, after years of having school teachers board with local families, the community came together to move the Frog Pond School to its current location across the lawn from the Millville School, where it would be utilized as a teacher's cottage.

In 1960 the Millville School, too, closed its

doors and was absorbed by the East Valley School District. Local residents worked to secure an agreement that the building would not be torn down, and thanks to their foresight we have the Community Center today.

The story of our local schools can teach us a lot about the importance of community involvement. The community saw a need for schools and worked to see them built. Teachers would not continue to work in the Foothills without adequate housing, so the community came together to create the teacher's cottage. Joining a larger district offered new opportunities for local students, but it also offered the community a chance to secure a local gathering place. In other words, concerned citizens saw what our schools needed and made it happen, then saw what our community needed and worked to preserve our local heritage.

OUTDOOR BURNING REMINDER



With the spring weather many residents' attention turns to cleaning up lawns and properties. Remember, however, when disposing of debris, outdoor fires in Spokane County are strictly regulated. It is illegal to burn yard and garden debris, construction

debris, and garbage. Burn barrels are also prohibited. Silvicultural debris (trees, stumps, limbs, needles from unimproved property) may be burned with a permit, or, under certain restrictions, without a permit.

Help keep our air clean, and help prevent forest fires – only burn when it is legal and necessary. For more information, contact the Spokane Regional Clean Air Agency (www.spokanecleanair.org) or the Washington Department of Natural Resources (www.dnr.wa.gov).

INCIDENT REPORTS

January 25, 2012 – Break-in/burglary

House located on 15000 block of Jacobs Road. Two intruders broke into the lower level through a casement window. Miscellaneous items were taken, including a rifle. The two male thieves were caught on a home security camera. While a vehicle was in the photos, it was not clear; no license plate was shown.

January 27, 2012 - Break-in/burglary

Home located on Temple Road. Burglary occurred between 12:30pm and 4:00pm. After failing to open the front door with a crow bar; the thieves made entry through the steel back door. The door



metal was bent away from the lock, the lock was broken and the dead bolt separated from the door jam. Pieces of the door were found on the opposite side of the room. The thieves searched through kitchen and china hutch cabinets, bedroom cedar chest and dresser drawers, and under

mattresses. Contents of drawers were tossed all over the floors. Items stolen included: TV, sound system, DVD player, cameras, GPS, memorabilia from a deceased parent, jewelry box, baskets, DVD's, computer operating system disks, bear spray, camping head lamps, new pair of Cabela's boots, and miscellaneous items. Unfortunately the driveway gate had been left open.

February 2, 2012 - burglary and arrest

A resident was working on his house on north Forker Rd. when he had to leave for approximately ten minutes. When he returned home he found an adult male, later identified as Harold A. Willey, loading items from the victim's garage into the back of Willey's pickup truck. Seeing the victim, Willey jumped in the truck and sped away.

The victim followed Willey and reported his description and location to 911. Following a pursuit, Spokane County Sheriff's officers stopped and arrested Willey near Bruce Rd. and Hwy 206.

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The Foothills Rural Association, 11000 N. Forker Road, was established as a non-profit corporation under section 502(C) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code on December 12, 1983. The purposes of the corporation are to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9, Station 6: to provide a forum by which the property owners and/ or current residents to assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area: to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

Voting Membership in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident within the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20 per year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors.

FRA Alerts system has been established in an effort to increase community awareness about crime occurring in our area. Residents are encouraged to report ALL crimes to Crime Check, 456-2233.
