WHAT'S UP WITH FORKER ROAD?

Everyone probably saw the water running down the Forker Road hill to the Valley during the winter melts earlier this year, with ice warnings, reduced speeds, and additional road work. What was going on? According to a Spokane County engineer, the water over the road was due to several springs, which they were able to locate with help from Geotechnical Service. The repair project included digging out two sections of road and placing pipe and rock to hopefully keep the water flowing and from resurfacing. The County patched the cuts back with concrete and will finish repairs in the spring.


Other upcoming Forker Road projects:

- There is a culvert replacement to a small bridge on Forker, close to Highway 206 planned for later this year.
- For the ongoing Bigelow Gulch/Forker Road Corridor project, the County starts construction of Bigelow 3 (the straight section just west of Argonne Road) in a few months.
- The county is also finishing up the purchase of easement land where the corridor will adjoin with Sullivan Road. That project will be coordinated with the City of Spokane Valley work planned at Trent and Sullivan.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

One of the important responsibilities of the Foothills Rural Association is the maintenance of the Community Center, the original Foothills School. The FRA has an archive of historical documents and photos. Below is an excerpt from a document found in the history archive, along with a photo from Foothills School in 1927.

Excerpt from "The Development and Growth of the Foothills, Wash. School System" prepared by Roger Johnson, August 1983

May 1st, 1905, bids were advertised in the "Oatburst" publication in Spokane for a new schoolhouse to be built. J.A. Kronquist got the bid for \$850.0 and obtained the services of Jim Horning to do the actual construction work. Lumber was hand picked from Kronquist's mill for the job.

August 24, 1905, the school was finished and examined by A. H. Callihan, Robert Hudlow, and F. L. Capell. It was found to be completed according to all plans and specifications.

Sept. 25, 1905 Miss Mary E Barndale was employed as the first teacher, starting on this date, for a period of eight months at \$50.00 per month. She resigned on the 29th of Nov. 1905. Miss Cassie McNeal was sent out by W. B. Watkins, County Sup't to fill the balance of the school term.

In 1911 the extension was built on the schoolhouse for the primary grades. It's [sic] cost was \$434.89. The large room was used, starting at this time, for the 8th, 9th, and 10th grades. At this same time all three school remaining were consolidated in District #3. The "Frogpond" and the "The Old Yellow School" continued with the primary departments. The first high school teacher was A. J. Smith. It appears that high school work was discontinued in 1920. The Frogpond and Pleasant Valley schools were closed at that time. Millville's name gradually changed to Foothills. The district changed to #303 in 1918.



THE NUMBERS MATTER!

If you have a fire or medical emergency at your home, you want the fire department there as fast as possible. Unfortunately, even in the age of GPS, it can be hard to find a home if the address is not clearly marked at the end of the driveway. Not only is this a good idea, it is actually required by Spokane County Code.

Take a look at the end of your driveway - would your address number be clear to someone driving by, even at night or in a storm? The firefighters of Spokane County Fire District 9 want to help! The fire district will install, free of charge, a highly visible reflective address number post for your address. These posts are white with 4-inch-tall reflective numbers and are easy for emergency service personnel to see, day or night.

It is easy to get an address post installed at your address. Simply contact District 9 Administration at (509) 466-4602 and leave a message with your name, address, and telephone number. A district employee will contact you to confirm the information, and then they will have a post manufactured and installed in a visible location at your address.

Don't leave the fire department searching for your home when you need them most; contact them for a free hi-vis address post today!

Consideration will be given to:

- Need and use of the scholarship (as explained in the essay)
- Academic achievements including Grade Point Average (GPA)
- Activities: can include school, community service, FRA participation, work experience, etc.
- Foothills residency (based on home address)
- Completion of the application materials and process as instructed

- Applicants are required to be interviewed on the evening of THURSDAY MAY 20th. We will do interviews in-person at the Community Center (masks and social distancing required).

The Foothills Rural Association, 11000 N. Forker Road, was established as a non-profit corporation under section 502(c)4 of the Internal Revenue Code on December 12, 1983. The purposes of the corporation are to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9 Station 6 to provide a forum by which the property owners and/or current residents can assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area; and to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

Voting Membership in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident within the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20 per year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors.

The Foothills Community Center, 11000 N. 
