Despite some challenging weather, the FRA Annual Meeting filled the community center with people interested in participating in the community and hearing the special presentation.


Stan Wills entertained and educated everyone on the history of the American Flag. Dressed in authentic colonial

### THE DANGER OF RANGING DOGS

Early this month, a doe died an agonizing and unnecessary death at the jaws of neighborhood dogs. The dogs' attack on the defenseless doe was recorded by local landowners, so there is visual evidence of which dogs were there. A Sheriff's Deputy euthanized the suffering animal and tried to determine whose dogs were the culprits. The Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife was contacted. The dog owners could face fines and pay damages to the State and to the landowner who has lost one of his goats.

I was contacted to retrieve the euthanized doe from the area of MacMahan Rd. I serve on the Inland Northwest Wildlife Council's Big Game Recovery Unit. This group of volunteers salvage wildlife meat which is donated to a local charity. My wife and I picked it up, took it to a shed, butchered it, and it was delivered to Union Gospel Mission Monday morning.

Just because we live In the country, residents are not relieved of the responsibility for their dogs. It Is illegal in Spokane County to let your animal trespass, endanger people or livestock, or harass, chase, or kill wildlife.

This has been a tough winter for deer. There is little food and it has been covered with deep and crusted snow at times. The fat reserves were exhausted on this doe as they are for all deer this spring. Just the chasing of the deer may cause spontaneous abortions of their fetuses, and the final month of fawn development exacts a heavy physical toll on a doe's body, and many does do not survive the spring before fawns are born.

Dogs in a group are a pack. They can be dangerous and unpredictable. Please keep your pets at home for your dog's safety, wildlife health, and resident's rights to not have a roaming menace trespassing their personal property.




# **2017 SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS ARE OPEN!**

The FRA in conjunction with the Blue Ribbon Circle will again be offering the Jess Kronquist Memorial Scholarship this spring. We estimate that over the years we have awarded over forty thousand dollars of scholarship money to support the continued education of Foothills Rural Association families. The scope of potential applicants is broad. Whatever/wherever you may be studying, if you could use some help with tuition, please consider applying this year. 

Scholarships will be awarded to Foothills residents as determined by the Foothills Rural Association Scholarship Committee.

### Consideration will be given to:

- Need and use of the scholarship (as explained in the essay)
- Academic achievements including Grade Point Average (GPA)
- Activities: can include school, community service, FRA participation, work experience, etc.
- Foothills residency (based on home address)
- Completion of the application materials and process as instructed

Finally, please provide a clear explanation of need, being specific re: how you will be paying for your education including other need and/or merit-based scholarships or aid and parent/family assistance. To help the Committee evaluate your application fairly, please be sure to clearly and directly address all of the considerations listed in the bullets above.

### Submission:

- Return all application materials to the Committee chairperson (below) no later than MAY 10, 2017.
- Applicants are required to be interviewed by the FRA Scholarship Committee.
- Applicants will be contacted for this interview which will take place on the evening of MAY 19, 2017.

The Foothills Rural Association, 11000 N. Forker Road, was established as a non-profit corporation under section 502(C) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code on December 12, 1983. The purposes of the corporation are to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9, Station 6: to provide a forum by which the property owners and/or current residents to assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area: to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

Voting Membership in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident within the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20 per year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors. FRA Alerts system has been established in an effort to increase community awareness about crime occurring in our area. Residents are encouraged to report ALL crimes to Crime Check, 456-2233. 
