## On the Prowl for Owls

On Sunday the 16th, I decided to run up on Mt. Spokane to see if any migrating birds were to be seen. No luck there. The trees were covered with snow and frost. I seldom find birds in those conditions. However, while driving slowly between the snowmobile parking area and the No.1 ski lift, I spotted a small round shape on a frosty branch in a barren deciduous tree. The branch was overhanging the road and as I hoped and guessed, the round object was a Northern Pygmy Owl. It was jerking its head back and forth in an obvious hunting mode. With all the new snow, it was undoubtedly having trouble finding something to eat. It only stayed there long enough for me to snap a few photos from about 40 feet below.



These are 4 of the 7 or 8 baby Barn Owls that were born in one of our barn owl nest boxes on Alan Knott's farm on the west plains. Eight is the average number of eggs that are normally laid. The number that survives to fledge depends on the amount of food the adults can provide. Field mice or voles are the preferred food for Barn Owls but in drier areas, they may depend on desert rats. Babies normally fledge when they are 3 months old. Those that leave too early may not make it. Once a Barn Owl leaves the nest, they usually are on their own and if they can fly, they may go many miles away to settle their own homestead. The Skinny on ZIP 99217

The purposes of the corporation are to organize the property owners and/or current residents within the boundaries of Fire District 9, Station 6: to provide a forum by which the property owners and/or current residents to assist governmental agencies in better planning the use and resources of the Foothills area: to preserve and protect the rural agricultural environment.

**Voting Membership** in the Association is open to any property owner or current resident within the Foothills boundaries. Membership dues are \$20 per year. Non-voting Membership is available to others through payment of dues. The Association is governed by elected volunteer officers and a board of directors.

A Community Crime Log has been established in an effort to increase community awareness about crime occurring in our area. The crime log will be published in the newsletter. Residents are encouraged to report all crimes to the police. After making a police report, please call: 928-6610.

The Foothills Community Center, located on Forker Road, adjacent to the Foothills Fire Station, exists as a result of community efforts to save and renovate the former Foothills School Building. 
